taking MRD, MPros, MPerio, MEndo & ISFE examinations with the result that this leads to young dentists wanting to join and contribute to our Society in the years to come.

There are many other things happening at present. Lorna McCaul is leading the response of the Society to the recent peer review head and

neck document. She is also currently coordinating a questionnaire for all Restorative Dentistry trainees on their aspirations for the future and training in head and neck oncology. Head and neck cancer patients

Care and management

The British Society of Prosthodontics does a broad range of work in promoting the discipline of Prosthodontics: education, research and care delivery in all areas of dental practice, from general dental practice – be this under NHS provision or privately - to specialised care in specialist private practice and the teaching and general hospitals.

One such area which has had an increased profile within sections of the society in recent months is the role played by Consultants in Restorative Dentistry in the care and management of head and neck cancer patients throughout their iourney, from diagnosis through treatment and recovery and rehabilitation. This is a vitally important aspect of care for these patients, which does not always receive due attention from the funders of care. We all have a role to play in the care of these patients, as they need both the immediate management at the acute stage of their illness which is delivered by specialists and thereafter life-long care from general practioners aware of the increased risk of dental disease and the difficulty in oral care which many of these patients face.

Recently, National Cancer Peer Review has brought to light that several head and neck cancer teams were non-compliant in the measure which requires that they have appropriately trained Consultants in Restorative Dentistry as part of the core team. They proposed, therefore, to drop this measure. Thankfully with pressure brought to bear by Lorna McCaul, supported by many others, this decision has been reversed and there is now work ongoing to identify how more teams can achieve compliance. BSSPD along with our sister societies. ACSRD and BSRD will

work together to address this in a number of different ways. Accordingly, a joint Head and Neck Cancer subgroup of the 3 societies has been formed and will be led by ACSRD. Communication in relation to this work will be greatly facilitated by the BSSPD members' forum.

There are a number of key areas in which this work will be continued by the subgroup, one of which is ensuring NICE continues to recognise the need for Consultant Restorative Dentistry input as a core member of Head and Neck MDT and enshrine this within new guidelines due in 2015. We have the support of the National Clinical Director for Cancer for NHS England in this. Head and Neck cancer services, and all this involves, will be commissioned by NHS England and we are taking steps to ensure we are involved in this process. Lorna McCaul has been working on guidelines with the support of the society and several other members (Chris Butterworth, Craig Barclay and Mike Fenlon) within this crucial area of care for this small but sadly ever increasing number of patients. The aim is to produce a national guideline around predicting and managing long term oral complications for these patients.

Good luck to all who represent our patients first and foremost, and the service we provide for those patients, in their efforts to succeed in raising the profile of how valuable this area of work is.

As more work is done and developments move on in this area, we will continue to keep the membership informed, via the Webpages, Newsletter and Online Forums.

BSSPD Prize Awards 2014

Congratulations to all our prize winners

BSSPD Gold Medal

As a Past President of the BSSPD, Professor Robert Clark will be very well known to us. He was the Founding Professor of Prosthetic Dentistry in the University of Hong Kong and more latterly Professor of Prosthetic Dentistry at King's College London Dental Institute until his retirement in 2009.



He is still very active as an Emeritus Professor, and has continued to publish and teach. As will be well known he has been particularly involved with postgraduate students over many years. In this role he has been highly effective in providing them with a solid grounding in research methodology, and his expertise has resulted in their participation in research projects that are of publishable quality. Furthermore he has been a passionate believer and ambassador for the maintenance of prosthodontics at undergraduate level.

He has made significant contributions to the evidence base of Prosthodontics including complete denture retention, ethnic morphological variations relevant to denture construction, removable partial denture design, functional reconstruction after maxillectomies, and more recently dimensional accuracy of acrylic resin processing and acrylic resin bonding. All

have been reported to the Society over many years. His portfolio of research is extensive and he has published a very large number of papers in peer reviewed national & international journals.

At the BSSPD both he and his students have won many prizes in past years including the Schottlander Oral and Poster Prize. As a stalwart of conference presentations we believe that he submitted his 65th abstract to the Society's Annual conference in 2013.

Professor Robert Clark has excelled over his long career in all three major areas of our specialty, namely clinical excellence, an exceptional role in education, and excellence in research. His work and reputation has brought credibility both to the specialty of Prosthodontics in the UK and the BSSPD itself. For all of these reasons, and many more, he is a very worthy recipient of the highest honour that can be awarded by this Society.

Harold W. Preiskel

Congratulations to Harold Preiskel one of the Society's long standing members, who has recently been inducted into the renowned College of Dentistry of Ohio State University Prosthodontic Hall of Fame, only the sixth such inscription in the last century or so of its history.



Many members will be familiar with Harold and his work, but for those less so included below is a brief synopsis of his career with emphasis on his links with Prosthodontics with our American colleagues.

Harold is Emeritus Professor of Prosthodontics at King's College Dental Institute, and in speciality private practice. He was Consultant in Prosthetic Dentistry at Guys for more than 30 years where he founded the dental implant programme.

He graduated at Guy's Hospital Dental School then won a scholarship to study Prosthodontics under the legendry Carl Boucher. He obtained his Masters Degree at Ohio State University in 1963, returned to London and addressed the BSSPD for the first time in 1964. He has been a member ever since.

Amongst his many academic achievements and positions are the first President of The International College of Prosthodontists and the first non-American President of the American Prosthodontic Society. He has also been Past President of the American Dental Society of London. The Greater New York Academy of Prosthodontics appointed him 'Distinguished Lecturer of the Year 2008'.

It is good to see such recognition of a career long association with prosthodontics within the USA. Well done.

Schottlander Oral Prize

The Schottlander Oral Prize was awarded to **Dr Gerry McKenna** University of Cork for his presentation "Tooth replacement for partially dentate older patients: a cost-effective analysis". The prize presentation is being made later in the year.

BSSPD Annual Conference

Dundee, 14th - 15th April 2014

The 61st annual conference of the British Society of Prosthodontics was held at the usual time of year in the lead up to Easter. There was a good attendance of dentists as well as a number of dental technicians, who were no doubt attracted by the quality of the speakers. Delegates travelled to Dundee mainly from Scotland and the rest of the UK as well as a few who had come from further afield including Canada and Jordan.

The theme of the conference for 2014 was "Aesthetics in Prosthodontics" and the Society was extremely fortunate to have a panel of speakers who have well deserved reputations and recognized clinical expertise in this area at both national and

international level. Within the group of presentations the whole range of fixed, removable, implant and maxillofacial prosthodontics was explored in relation to the aesthetic issues that can arise in the provision of restorative care.

Following the opening of the conference by Professor Mark Hector, Dean of Dundee Dental School, the first speaker on Day 1 was Dr. Basil Mizrahi who explored in detail with the delegates how

favourable aesthetic and biomechanical outcomes can be achieved in fixed prosthodontics. Basil is a very well known specialist working both in a referral based private practice in London as well as the UCL Eastman Dental Institute, and runs hands-on and didactic courses for dentists. He took the delegates through a fascinating presentation in which his attention to detail and focus on precision at every stage

was clearly evident in all the work that he provided for his patients.

The second speaker, Dr. Kevin Lochhead set up a specialist practice in Edinburgh over 20 years ago which has become a very well-known referral centre for dentists throughout Scotland. Alongside the group of specialists, is a fully developed technologist facility which services the needs of his multidisciplinary referral practice. Kevin spoke about achieving optimum aesthetic outcomes using removable prosthodontics. In a very thoughtful and well-illustrated presentation, Kevin talked through a range of techniques used in complete and partial denture construction focusing on optimal

outcomes both in relation to aesthetics and function.

Lunch was taken in a suite adjacent to the lecture area where delegates were also able to visit trade displays from a number of exhibiting companies. This was immediately followed by a poster session in which there was a range of presentations on display. Topics included three dimensional imaging of the face, assessment and treatment planning for oncology patients.

for oncology patients, zygomatic implants, audits, and many others. The Schottlander poster prize was awarded to Ahmed Al-Hilou who, together with his colleagues from the Leeds Dental Institute, presented a poster titled "In-Vitro Evaluation of Fluoroapatite Coatings against Peri-Implantitis".

Onto the afternoon, during a two part session, Dr. Tidu Mankoo presented a

very detailed review of the surgical and prosthodontic concepts in relation to the restoration of "failing" teeth with implants in the aesthetic zone. Tidu runs a renowned referral practice based in Windsor, UK and carries out both the surgical and prosthodontic components of his cases himself. In his very comprehensive and thought provoking presentation, Tidu

explored the treatment planning aspects of complex cases. He also directed the delegates to consider how aesthetic outcomes depend not only on the clinical management, but also on an understanding of the importance of the biological factors related to the soft tissues and underlying bone.

The conference dinner was held on The Frigate Unicorn, a few minutes walk from the conference hotel.

In true Scottish tradition the delegates were piped to their tables. The main speaker, Mr Bill Copeland, a lawyer by background, entertained the guests greatly during his speech with his unique brand of West of Scotland humour.

Day 2 of the conference commenced with an important event in the life of the Society – the presentation of the Gold Medal. This is only awarded every three years to an individual who has given exceptional service to the Society and the specialty of Prosthodontics. In 2014 the BSSPD Gold Medal was awarded to Professor Robert Clark.

The first presentation of the morning came from Mr John Wibberley who explored the challenges of creating aesthetic excellence from the viewpoint of a dental and clinical dental technician. John is a very well


known individual in the dental profession, who has built up two laboratories over his long career. In an elegant and extremely informative presentation, John presented his thoughts on many of the technical aspects of creating aesthetic excellence in prosthodontics. John had recently qualified as a Clinical Dental Technician, and it was therefore particularly interesting

to understand how this new role has allowed him to combine clinical skills with his huge experience over many years in the laboratory.

The next session, which completed the morning programme and extended into the afternoon after lunch, was a group of presentations from delegates competing for the Schottlander Oral Prize. There were four individuals shortlisted to present from a competitive

field of applications. The winner was Dr. Gerry McKenna from the University College, Cork, Ireland whose presentation was titled "Tooth replacement for partially dentate older patients: a cost-effective analysis".

The final presentation at the conference came from Mr Peter Briggs, the incoming president of the BSSPD, who explored rehabilitation challenges in relation to aesthetics in the management of trauma, oncology and developmental disorders. Peter is well known as a Consultant in Restorative Dentistry in London as well as running a specialist referral practice. In this particularly challenging area of clinical practice, he shared with us some of the issues that arise in relation to significant soft and hard tissue loss, and the outcomes and complications of treatment strategies

Calling all Implant-Prosthodontists!

The National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) has funded a pilot randomised controlled trial comparing mini-implants to standard-diameter implants in the rehabilitation of the edentulous mandible.

The pilot trial is being carried out at the University of Manchester Dental Hospital, hosted by Central Manchester Foundation Trust, and is currently in the recruitment phase. The research team are currently

seeking out suitable secondary care centres who may be in a position to participate in a large multicentre trial with long-term follow-up following completion of the pilot.

2016 Conference - Manchester
